RUSSELL PUSHES AHEAD IN AIR TOUR

Gains Points as Fliers Flash Into Fort Worth

Fort Worth, Tex., July 17—(A. P.)—Flashing across the finish line here ahead of the field, Harry L. Russell, Dearborn, substantially increased his lead in the national air tour today. His score was 29,828.7 points. Russell flew through rain, pushing his plane at an average speed of 136 miles an hour on the San Antonio-Fort Worth leg.

Lowell Bayles, of Springfield, Mass., followed Russell in. His score put him in third place. James H. Smart, of Pine Bluff, Ark., was third into Forth Worth and second in the tour. Jack Story, Kansas City, was in fourth place. Eddie Stinson, Detroit, was fifth to land here, his score placing him in sixth place with 26,097.5 points. Other contestants who arrived were Eddie Schneider, Jersey City; Joseph Meehan, Marysville, Mich.; Lieutenant Lee Gehlbach, Detroit, and Captain William Lancaster, New York. The only contestant who did not check in today was William E. Dickson, Pittsburgh, held up in New Orleans by bad weather and in Shreveport when the wind damaged his plane. Dickson is expected to catch up with the other tourists here tomorrow.

The planes will remain here until Sunday, when they will take off for Tulsa.
