TWENTY PASSENGERS FREIGHT PLANES WILL BE HERE FOR OVERNIGHT STOP

Dallas will get a fleeting glimpse of twenty passenger and freight airplanes—ships which in two, four or five years probably will be flying in and out of this city as the established commercial air center of the Southwest-when the Na-

established commercial air center of the Southwest—when the National Air Tour makes an eighteenhour, overnight stop here next Friday and Saturday.

Amid the greeting of thousands of spectators from Dallas and Texas, these giants of the air, which left Defroit on June 27 for a 3,500-mile tour of twenty-five of the important cities of the East. South and Middle West, will make a landing at Love Field Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The tour party has cruised on record time so far along the tour route. Robert J. Smith of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce announced Wednesday, and will nose their ships towards Dallas, the most southern and western point on the route. Friday morning from Pine Bluff.

The welcome, which will be the most elaborate staged here in years, has already been planned under the direction of the Dallas flying club, the city administration and the Chamber of Commerce. A huge reception at Love Field and an 'all-aviation' banquet at the Bakerhotel will be the highlights of the program.

All Texas has been urged to take part in the Dallas reception and to see the exhibition of future commercial aviation. Thursday noon, Charles R Braun, division traffic manager of the National Air Transport, will extend an invitation to the people of the state over Station KRLD to attend the flying meet. Aviators from the larger cities of Texas will join with local air men in forming a flying squadron to greet the visitors.

The planes themselves will be the most interesting feature of the tour. Several types of ships, never seen in Dallas before, will be included in the group. Two huge Ford transports will lead the visiting party. Both of these planes will be trimotored ships, carrying ten passengers and equipped with every comfort of modern flying. They will be glassed-in cabin ships. They will be glassed-in cabin ships, constructed so that passengers will not suffer the ill effects of the worst weather and will be permitted to converse in ordinary one. Both of these Ford planes will be similar to Byrd's "America." and the huge Fokker which carried the army flyers from San Francisco to Honolulu.
