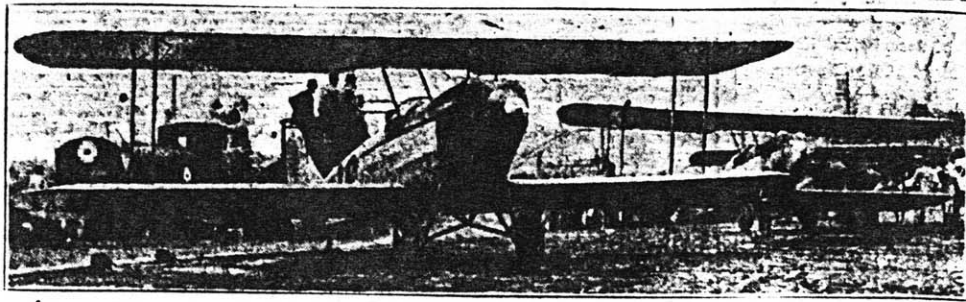


When the Reliability Tour Planes Called Here

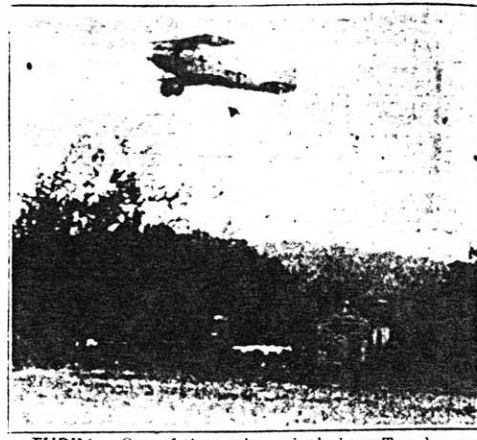
WARMING UP. The head of a long line of planes warming up for the start from Des Moines following the call here Tuesday of the Ford reliability tour.



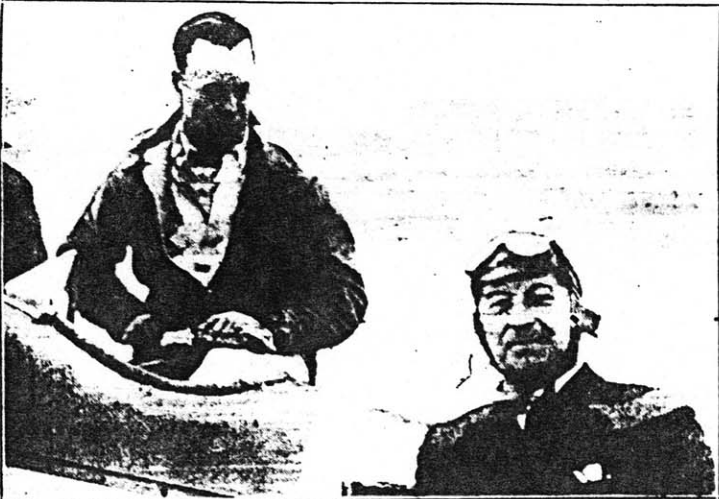
PART OF THE CROWD. Part of the crowd of more than 5,000 persons who greeted the Ford reliability tour airplanes here Tuesday afternoon.



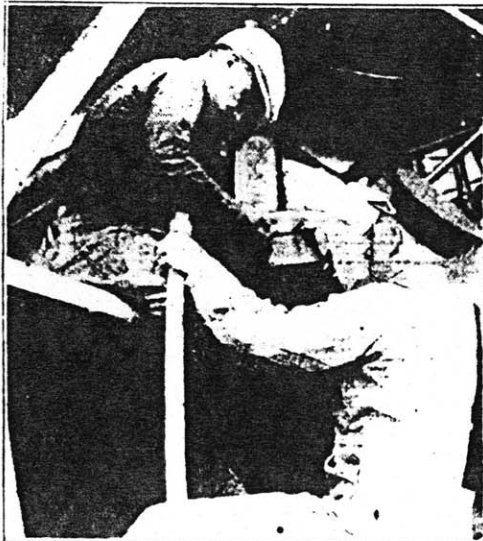
CASEY JONES. None other. He was pilot of the big Curtiss 22 which called here Tuesday.
