


MARY VACATIONING IN GERMANY.
Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks are enjoying a holiday at Baden-Baden, Germany. Mary is shown traveling in popular style of the town.




HUGE CONDOR.

Here is the largest ship in the air tour, as it stood in line at airport with the many other ships. It is eighteen passenger Curtiss Condor, and is powered by two motors.


