Russell Keeps Lead in National Tour

Birmingham, Ala., July 11—(A.P.)—Harry L. Russell, Dearborn, continued to hold the lead over eight other contestants in the National Air tour as the planes landed at the municipal airport here today for an overnight stop.

Russell had 23,677 points to his credit tonight. He was far ahead of his closest rival, James H. Smart, Pinebluff, Ark., who had a total of 22,204.

Other pilots and their positions were: Lowell R. Bayles, Springfield, Mass., third, 18,009; Jack B. Story, Kansas City, Mo., fourth, 16,332; William Lancaster, New York, fifth, 15,937; Eddie Stinson, Dearborn, sixth, 15,492; Lee Gehlbach, Detroit, seventh, 15,049; George Edward Dickson, Pittsburgh, eighth, 13,005, and Joe Meehan, Maryville, Mich., 12,562.

The planes will take off at 10 a. m. tomorrow for Montgomery, a distance of about 100 miles.


ALLEGED GAMBLER HELD ON CHARGE OF MURDER
