TOUR PLANES Aviator Hopes to Make 4,500-Mile Non-Stop Flight.

20,000 Are on Hand at Landing Field to Watch Arrival of 16 Fliers.

TULSA, Okla., July 9.—All of the airplanes competing in the National

Air Tour for the Edsel Ford Trophy arrived here with a perfect score for the flight from Oklahoma City and are scheduled to take off for Wichita and Omaha tomorrow morning with Eddie Stinson still retaining his lead for high score.

More than 20,000 persons were on and around the field here when the planes landed and despite the in-tense heat more were on their way to the field tonight to see the 16 contesting and accompanying planes, among which are the pick of the American aircraft industry. The tour will stop at five more cities and arrive at the Ford Airport Tuesday afternoon. Wichita will be a noonday stop

for lunch and gas at the municipal airport. The tour's visit to Omaha will be the occasion of the dedication of a new municipal airport there. From Omaha the fleet will head east across the state of Iowa in one hop to Moline, Ill., and arrive at Hammond, Ind. Monday evening at the Chicago terminal of the Ford Motor Co.'s Detroit-Chicago air line. From Hammond the planes will fly to Grand Rapids for a midday stop and then take off on the home stretch. The schedule for the arrival at the Ford Airport has not been set, but the tentative arriving time is 4 p. m.

A reception and dinner to the returning pilots of the 1927 National Air Tour will be held under the auspices of the Board of Commerce in the Hotel Statler Tuesday. The principal speakers will be

William P. McCracken, secretary of aeronautics in the Department of Commerce, and Maj. Thomas G. Lanphier, commandant of Selfridge Field.

The Edsel Ford trophy will be presented the tour winner by the donor. Harold H. Emmons will be toastmaster. Women's clubs have been invited to attend.

GEORGIA TO BRAZIL ... FLIGHT IS PLANNED

Mile Non-Stop Flight.

BRUNSWICK, Ga., July 9. - (A) Paul H. Redfern, Savannah aviator, signed a contract here today for 4,500-mile non-stop flight from Brunswick to Rio de Janeiro, an undertaking described by its sponsors as more hazardous than the recent transatlantic hops of Lindbergh, Chamberlin and Byrd.

(Staff Correspondent The Detroit News.) The flier, who recently gave up hopes of a San Francisco-Hololulu flight after the successful trip of Lieut. Maitland and Lieut. Hegen-berger, announced his plans after the project had been underwritten by a group of local business men who subscribed \$25,000 for it.

He said he would use a mono-plane now being built by the Stinson Aircraft Corp., at Detroit which will be equipped with a Wright whirlwind motor of the same type that carried the Atlantic and Pacific air conquerors. He expects to fly the craft here from Detroit upon its completion.

Redfern said he would travel alone.

The aviator has a record of 1,840 hours in the air and has gained wide flying experience during a service of several years with the United States customs office at Savannah.
