Bellanca Record-Breaking Plane in Air Tour Here

Packard Air Chief Lands Noted Craft, Powered With Diesel Engine at Rodgers Field; Established Non-Refueling Endurance Mark.

Accompanying the National Air Tour which visited Pittsburgh yesterday was Captain Walter E. Lees, chief engineer of the aircraft department of the Packard Motor Company, flying the Bellanca plane equipped with the Packard Diesel engine in which he and Frederick Brossy recently established a world's record non-refueling endurance flight of 84 hours 33 minutes in Florida. He was accompanied by his secretary, F. A. Kummer, and was greeted

at Rodgers Field by Seth Hughes, local representative of the Packard Motor Company.

The Packard motor is a great improvement over previous types of oil-burning engines, and can be regulated in a manner impossible to other engines of this type, said Captain Lees, who is a timer for the air tour. He said that the long jaunt had established conclusively the value of the Diesel engine, and declared that it is much safer than a gasoline motor.

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
