



Plymouth, Vt., Aug. 8.—The position of President Coolidge is that the negotiations relative to the war-time debt owed by France to the United States are

President Coolidge was informed tonight through press dispatches of the open letter Former Premier Clemenceau of France has addressed to him on the war debts and it was indicated that his attitude was that the Washington government intends to conduct its relations with the French people on all questions through their duly constituted diplomatic authorities.

Any further outline of the views of the chief executive toward the Clemenceau letter was unavailable.
